Course Overview: This English course in literature and composition consists of four

## Course Description

- This English course in literature and compasition consists of four thematically organized units. Within each unit, attention is given to these specific genres- nonfiction, short stories, plays, novels, and poetry. Students will study the classic pieces of literature as well as modern works, which have established a place in our culture.
- Below are the four units and the main text covered during that quarter. These are NDT the only texts covered during each quarter, and students should be prepared to do reading outside of class.
Tue units are divided into the following
Ist 9 weeks: Short Story Unit
$2^{\text {nd }} 9$ weeks: Shakespeare Unit: Romea and Juliet
$3^{\text {rd }} 9$ weeks: American Literature Unit: To Kill a Mackingbird
$4^{\text {th }} 9$ weeks: UNDECLIDED: Mythology or Dystopian??

Determine a theme ar central idea of a text and analyze in detail its development over the course of the text, including how it emerges and is shaped and refined by specific details; provide an objective summary of the text.
Initiate and participate effectively in a range of collaborative discussions (one-on-one, in groups, and teacher-led) with diverse partners on grades 9 -10 tapics, texts, and issues, building an others' ideas and expressing their own clearly and persuasively.
Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English grammar and usage when writing and speaking.
Write informative/explanatory texts to examine and convey complex ideas, concepts, and information clearly and accurately through the effective selection and arganization of content.

## Student Achievement

- Grades are based on mastery of standards. If a student can demonstrate an understanding of the course material, then he a she earns a passing grade for that material.
- Class work, homework, and class participation are vitally important to student learning because it helps students practice skills and gain course knowledge.
- HDWEVER, the majority of a student's grade will come from assessments (tests, projects, papers, etc.) because these tasks allow students to demonstrate what they have learned.
Grading Scale:
- -Assessments are worth $50 \%$. This includes: tests, quizzes, papers, and projects.
- -Practice is wo $40 \%$. This includes: in-class assignments, homework, pre-writing, activities, and parricipation.
